This checklist is meant to be used with the **Exceptional Lives Massachusetts Transition Guide**.

Items in red are most important. Families should be sure to do the blue items as well.

Who this is for: Students who have intellectual or developmental disabilities and will move from special education into adult living. These are students who will be in school until they are 22.

What the focus is: Connecting with adult services and improving independent skills.

**Key questions to think about:** Where will these students be at age 22? What will their day look like and where will they be living? What will they be doing for social connections?
