## **Checklist for Those Attending College**



This checklist is meant to be used with the Exceptional Lives Massachusetts Transition Guide.

Items in red are most important. Families should be sure to do the blue items as well.

Who this is for: Students who have mild to moderate disabilities, and who are overall high functioning. These
are students whose goals are to graduate high school, go to college, university or vocational school, and have
a career or job.

What the focus is: Ensuring appropriate services to do well in high school and prepare for college.

**Key questions to think about:** What services do these students need in order to be successful? What accommodations will help them learn in the classroom and prepare for college? What extra support might they need in college, and which college programs would offer this support?
