Items in red are most important. Families should be sure to do the blue items as well.

Who this is for: Students whose goals are to graduate from high school and get a job afterwards.

What the focus is: Ensuring appropriate services to do well in high school and prepare for employment.

**Key questions to think about:** What services do these students need in order to be successful? What accommodations will help them learn in the classroom? What pre-vocational training, work or internship opportunities can they do during high school to help prepare for future employment?
